CITY OF JACKSON

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 5.1 OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF JACKSON, TO CHANGE THE FILING DEADLINE FOR CANDIDATES SEEKING ELECTION TO CITY OFFICE.

This amendment would amend Section 5.1 of the City Charter to reflect the filing deadline imposed by state election law for filing nominating petitions to run for city office, by 4 p.m. on the twelfth Tuesday prior to the primary election of each odd-numbered year, and to delete the current deadline of 56 days before the primary which is no longer enforceable.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION 6.5(1) OF THE CHARTER OF THE CITY OF JACKSON, TO CHANGE THE DATE FOR CITY PRIMARY ELECTIONS.

This amendment would amend Section 6.5(1) of the City Charter to change the date for holding city primary elections from the first Tuesday after the second Monday of September in odd-numbered years (which is no longer enforceable due to changes in Michigan election law), to the first Tuesday after the first Monday or August in odd-numbered years. This amendment is being proposed to reflect the current state election law requirement that the city's primary election be held in August rather than in September.

JACKSON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

BOND PROPOSAL

Shall the Jackson Public Schools, County of Jackson, Michigan, borrow the principal sum of not to exceed Sixteen Million Six Hundred Forty Thousand Dollars (\$16,640,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds for the purpose of defraying the cost of constructing additions to and remodeling, equipping, furnishing, reequipping and refurnishing existing School District buildings; acquiring and installing technology infrastructure and equipment in School District buildings; and improving and developing sites, including outdoor athletic fields, facilities and structures in the School District and acquiring school buses?

The estimated millage to be levied in 2010 to service this issue of bonds is 1.01 mills (\$1.01 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds of this issue is 0.94 mills (\$0.94 per \$1,000 of taxable value). The School District estimates that the debt millage levy required to retire the Bonds of the District currently outstanding and proposed by this ballot proposal will be at or below 1.00 mill more than the School District's 2009 debt levy. The bonds may be issued in one or more series, payable in the case of each series in not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from the date of issue of such series. If the School District borrows from the State to pay debt service on the bonds of this issue, the School District may be required to continue to levy mills beyond the term of the bonds to repay the State.

(Under State law, bond proceeds may not be used to pay teacher, administrator or other employee salaries, routine maintenance costs or other School District operating expenses.)

LITCHFIELD COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

MILLAGE PROPOSAL, BUILDING AND SITE SINKING FUND TAX LEVY

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Litchfield Community Schools, Hillsdale, Jackson, Calhoun and Branch Counties, Michigan, be increased by and the board of education be authorized to levy not to exceed .75 mill (\$.75 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 2 years, 2009 and 2010, to create a sinking fund for the construction or repair of school buildings and all other purposes authorized by law; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2009 is approximately \$87,000?

WASHTENAW COUNTY INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL DISTRICT

REGIONAL ENHANCEMENT MILLAGE PROPOSAL

Pursuant to state law, the revenue raised by the proposed millage will be collected by the intermediate school district and distributed to local public school districts based on pupil membership count.

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Washtenaw Intermediate School District, Michigan, be increased by 2 mills (\$2.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 5 years, 2009 to 2013, inclusive, to provide operating funds to enhance other state and local funding for local school district operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the intermediate school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2009 is approximately \$30,000,000?
